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National Backyard Cricket:

An Amazing First Year Result With Nearly \$70,000 of Grants to 54 Country Public Libraries

s readers of our newsletter and FaceBook page know, FOLA has established a valuable relationship with National Backyard Cricket, an annual fundraising event in support of country public libraries.

For those who may have overlooked or forgotten about National Backyard Cricket, it's a fundraiser whereby anybody can organise a game of cricket — at their home, the local park, oval, beach, etc. and raise funds for worthy educational causes. It's the brainchild of the LBW Trust, an Australian charity that has raised millions of dollars over the last 15-plus years for worthy educational causes.

Historically, the LBW Trust (which stands for Learning for a Better World and is, of course, a cricket-themed double-entendre) has raised funds for disadvantaged high school and university students in cricket-playing nations, including India, Nepal, Sri Lanka, and elsewhere. With National Backyard Cricket they are expanding their fundraising efforts and mission by including a domestic educational cause.

With FOLA's assistance, the foundation has decided to direct a portion of the funds raised from National Backyard Cricket to Australia's country public libraries, especially given their financial challenges and the critical role they play in their communities.

FOLA could not have been happier with the decision. First, there is no national fundraising campaign that seeks to address the economic inequities that our rural, regional, and remote libraries face. Due to the small and often isolated and dispersed populations they serve, country libraries often struggle under "percapita" funding models. What is often easily achievable for a larger suburban or metropolitan library is utterly beyond the budget of many rural libraries.

Second, as every friend knows, our libraries provide essential community educational experiences for people of all ages. These include baby rhyme time and storytime for toddlers, homework help and research assistance for school children, language classes and career and employment support for culturally and

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"our libraries are far and away the most popular member-based organisations in Australia." linguistically diverse communities to technology classes for seniors. Due simply to their lack of scale, country libraries often struggle to deliver these experiences.

And finally, there has long been a curious gap between the investment our nation makes in sport relative to public libraries — in spite of the fact that our libraries are far and away the most popular member-based organisations in Australia. To the best of FOLA's knowledge, this is the first national fundraising campaign that combines one of Australia's national sporting pastimes with our love of public libraries.

In this inaugural year, National Backyard Cricket hosted 125 games of cricket and raised nearly \$70,000 in support of regional, rural and remote libraries across Australia. The fundraising included games at the Governor-General's residence in Canberra and at Government House in Hobart, plus dozens of games in country towns and city suburbs. Some cricket royalty were involved as well — including Justin Langer, Alex Blackwell, Ryan Carters and others — to raise awareness and promote the campaign.

Once the fundraising was over, we moved on to the next phase of the project: developing an application process and reaching out to country libraries. We settled on a super-simple application process; libraries were asked to apply for grants of \$500 to \$1,500 to implement or extend any existing education-related program or technology need. The application process was designed to take about 15 minutes to complete, and we worked closely with several public library leaders across the country to inform country libraries about the opportunity.

Dozens of libraries applied for grants, and 54 were identified to receive funding in support of a range of educational programs as well as purchasing computer equipment. The fundraising was supported by Harvey Norman, which generously donated \$27,000 worth of gift cards for deserving libraries to purchase desperately needed hardware.

We will be profiling more libraries in the coming issues of our newsletter, and we will also be sharing the stories of the impact of their National Backyard Cricket grants via our FaceBook page. 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SOME OF OUR WINNING LIBRARIES IN 2021..

Australind Public Library in the Shire of Harvey in Western Australia, applied for \$1,200 to purchase new computer equipment so more local primary aged children can participate in their weekly coding club. Upon learning of the grant branch manager Laine Brown wrote, İt is so wonderful to receive this grant as I know how much it will benefit our coding club kids."

Wagga Wagga City Library in regional New South Wales was awarded \$1,500 to expand its award winning multicultural programs, particularly its Language Café. This program engages 60 community volunteers to assist new community members with conventional English classes three days per week.

Kalbarri Public Library north of Geraldton on the coast of Western Australia was badly damaged by Cyclone Seroja on the 11th April. National Backyard Cricket granted the library \$1,500 to help rebuild and fill out the children's and young adult section of the library with new shelving and display equipment.

When St Arnaud Library (in the Northern Grampians, 250 km northwest of Melbourne) separated from the Wimmera Regional Library Corporation, it lost access to a Sphero kit of programmable robots. These devices have proven effective engaging young and old residents alike in technology, including learning the fundamentals of programming. A \$1,500 grant will be matched by the St Arnaud FOL group and allow them to buy a new Sphero kit for the community.

Cunnamulla Library serves a population of 1,100 people and is 800 km due west from Brisbane. They run a program called Deadly Digital Communities for the local Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community. In addition to the computers and tablets used for training purpose, they need the ability to print high quality colour images. We have provided the library with \$1,200 in gift cards to acquire the necessary hardware from Harvey Norman.

Our Commitment


Friends of African Village Libraries is committed to long-term financial and management support for small community libraries in rural Africa. Our goal is to establish long-term relationships with community libraries, rather than provide an initial donation and move on to another village. This is why the number of libraries in our network is small, as they are carefully managed to ensure their continued success. Burkina Faso alone has thousands of villages with primary schools and no libraries; the needs are immense, the means to address the need are limited.

Our Mission

We believe that every child and adult should have the opportunity to pick up a book and read. FAVL is dedicated to increasing access to reading material and other information in rural villages in sub-Saharan Africa. FAVLsupported libraries serve all members of the village community. One core public is the local community of readers — schoolchildren, adult learners, and other persons committed to reading. Most children, particularly in rural areas, have little access to books. While they may go to school, they will probably have little opportunity to read age-appropriate material. There are very few books available in rural schools. FAVL emphasizes books that are highly demanded by local readers: African novels and storybooks, children's books with village themes, and local language materials for the newly literate village reader.

How does FAVL work?

Village libraries are established when donations are sufficient to cover the long-term commitment to support a library. Communities in our program area establish a local management committee and provide a building or a building site for the library. FAVL will then help the village to refurbish an existing building, or build a new building, usually with solar power. A local librarian is hired and trained and the library is stocked with a selection of books. Village





libraries typically hold a collection of one or two thousand books, with titles in English, French, Arabic, and local languages. The typical library has a reading room, a community space and an office for the librarian. In addition to paying the librarian salaries and on-going maintenance of the library, FAVL also helps train library staff to implement reading programs and other activities at their location.

Where does FAVL operate?

FAVL has established and continues to manage and improve upon 38 libraries, 34 in Burkina Faso, 3 in Ghana, and 1 in Uganda. FAVL also supports the Uganda Community Library Association, with 50+ member libraries.

OUTSTANDING FRIENDS LEADERSHIP

"Friends are a major sponsor for most speaker visits and special library events." he Friends of the Library Alexandra and District Inc (Victoria) provide funds for events and resources to enhance the reach and services of the Alexandra Library into the community and for the enjoyment of library patrons. Friends are a major sponsor for most speaker visits and special library events. They also provide a very successful volunteer bookshop, raising annually some \$30,000.

In 2019/2020, together with membership fees and bookshop profit they gave to the library a donation of \$16,235.29 to improve, enhance, promote the Alexandra Library for the benefit of the community.

Major purchases for the year have been — magazine display cases, two couches, defibulator and curtains (\$6,255). Funding for library programs (\$4,356), library development (\$485), literature purchases (\$834).

The Friends produce a monthly newsletter which gives details of Friends and Library events.

A feature of this organisation, apart for the Bookshop, is the Junior Friends group which continues to provide a unique avenue for young people in the community to be fully engaged in the operation of a Friends Group, separate from the adult group.

This group has been well supported since establishment in 1991 by Libby Kotchet, a library staff member, who has remained the driving force for the unique success of this operation. Libby recently retired after 38 years of dedicated service to the library service. Friends Travelling Fellowship

GREAT IDEA FOR FRIENDS GROUPS

challenge for the Friends in 2020 was to fund the FNLA Creative Fellowship, FNLA Travelling Fellowship, and the gift to the NLA for the 50th anniversary of the building. This was achieved with the funds of \$29,255 being met from operating funds.

The 2019 Friends Travelling Fellowship was awarded to Rachael Eddowes. Rachael commenced working in the IT section of the Library in 2015, working to help connect the collection to those who use it.

Rachael's Fellowship involved travelling to the United Kingdom to survey digital engagement and discovery and attend the library user experience conference UXLibs. She toured libraries in Edinburgh, Aberystwyth, Oxford

and London, as well as the conference at the University of London Royal Holloway.

Rachael gave a presentation at the Friends 2020 AGM. Among her activities, she presented a conference poster From the Reading Room to

the Living Room, explored strategies for digital engagement at the Welcome Collection, and digital discovery at the Science Museum. She has since contributed her findings to Blueprint and other review processes at the Library and applied her knowledge in the

redesign of Trove.

The funding of a Fellowship to undertake research, study or travel for a library staff member, is something ALL Friends groups could consider. This is a project that many Friends of Library groups have undertaken in the USA.

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"Rachael's

Fellowships are open to individuals with research at any stage of development, as well as those undertaking research which forms part of a larger project. When an individual is contributing to a collaborative project, they must demonstrate their own research component.

The period of Fellowship research may lead to longer-term outcomes, rather than immediate publication or public outcomes. The Library does not expect Fellows to compete a body of work during the residency.

As part of the residency, all Fellows will benefit from:

- a sustained period of research based on the Library's collections
- special and supported access to collections
- access to the Fellows room, with full office facilities and a personal workstation

 copies of collection materials (within reasonable limits and according to access and copyright conditions)

Funded Fellowships will also receive the following financial support:

- an honorarium of AUD \$1,000 per week for 12 weeks
- accommodation support of AUD \$700 per week for 12 weeks if required (not payable to residents in the Canberra region)
- reimbursement of travel costs equivalent to one return domestic airfare to Canberra (not payable to residents in the Canberra region), subject to substantiation of the expenditure. Reimbursement of international travel is capped at AUD \$2,500, and limited to one return flight.

Friends of the East Hampton Public Library

he Friends of the East Hampton Library (USA) were established in the late 1960's to support the programs and offerings of the East Hampton Library.



Some of the programs undertaken include:

- sponsor author visits and other adult and children's programs
- · help purchase craft materials
- · fund Museum Passes
- fund a scholarship for local high school students
- · conduct book sales
- help organise other library events and fundraisers that encourage community members to visit the Library.

In 2019 they gained the Individual Achievement Award from the Friends of Connecticut Library Organisation. Victoria Fielding, President of the Friends of the East Hampton
Public Library was awarded
the Achievement Award for her
work reviving the long dormant
Friends group. At one point,

the Friends had a long and successful history. For years they were a strong organisation with their own permanent book sale and a robust membership. Some 13 years ago, however, the group faltered from a rift between members and thus remained mostly dormant. In January 2018, Victoria Fielding decided that the Friends group deserved a more active and robust organisation. She rallied the troops via Facebook posts and announcements in the local newspaper. From the first meeting with about 10 people, she worked tirelessly to grow the organisation again. Today the Friends contributes thousands of dollars towards the library each year. It has become a thriving organisation, once again.

Everyday Book Sale


Gently used hardcover books, softcovers and paperbacks, DVDs and CDs for patrons of all ages and interests are on sale during library hours on the first floor near the circulation desk. There is an honour box for payment, or you can pay online.

Help with Used Books

Volunteers are needed year round to sort and organise books. And many hands are needed prior to the Book Sale for set up, sales and clean up. Interested in helping out? Fill out a volunteer from and well shall get in touch.

Donate Books to the Friends

Your donation of books will help fund programs for Library patrons of all ages. A tax receipt is available at the Library information desk.





Book Donation Guidelines

The Friends of the Belmont Public Library greatly appreciates the generous donation of your gently used books, DVDs and CDs. Donations should be dropped off at the library's delivery entrance behind the building.

We ask that you consider the following before making your donation. We cannot sell books that are:

- Dirty
- Mouldy
- Highlighted or underlined
- Water stained, yellowed or brittle
- Outdate (ie old computer manuals, travel books more than 10 years old)
- Textbooks
- Very dog-eared

We accept DVDs and CDs that still play but we cannot accept any other media or electronic (no LPs, VHS, computers, monitors etc).

We must throw away books that we cannot sell and this consumes much volunteer labour. So. before donating, please ask yourself: "would I but this book?".


