FROM THE EXECUTIVE OFFICER



FOLA is confronting its greatest challenge: meeting the expectations and needs of its constituency.

I can clearly define nine challenges ahead.

ALIA – building a stronger relationship with the Australian Library and Information Association (the peak body representing the library profession). As a consequence of initial discussions with the ALIA Board in June, both our President and myself affirm the importance of this link, to the mutual benefit of both bodies. We are encouraged greatly by Dr Alan Bundy (ALIA President) and Jennefer Nicholson (ALIA Executive Director).

Library education – steps are being undertaken to develop links into library schools around Australia, affirming the need for 'Friends' to be incorporated in the curriculum.

National Libraries Research – Under the auspices of the Council of Australian State Librarians, Libraries Alive! have won the project contact to conduct research into the establishment of an Australian Public Library Network. The first phase is research, then consultation. FOLA will be providing information into this important project. **Public Libraries in Victoria** – The Victorian government has commissioned The Strategy Shop to develop a draft library policy for Victorian libraries, replacing the existing policy, Libraries 21. FOLA has provided a submission to this review, which will canvass issues and directions in the Victorian library system.

Civic Participation – Trends over the past few years are indicating that more people wish to take part in 'democratising' private institutions and public agencies. Accountability has become an issue. Bank closures in rural Australia and civic involvement in taking action to establish rural community banks is just one illustration.

Challenge from governments – Governments are passing more onto the user, not merely in the form of the GST. More public utilities are being corporatised or sold off. And funding for public utilities, such as libraries, is challenged for ever scarce dollars.

Volunteerism – A growing dependance on volunteers, but a decreasing number of volunteers than say, a few decades ago, place an added burden on institutions and communities. Libraries are using more volunteers to undertake, sometimes, professional tasks, especially in rural library services.

WWW – The worldwide web has opened each library to a vast repository of both 'junk' and 'knowledge'. Friends groups have the opportunity to link with other like-minded groups around Australia and beyond.

Community expectations – As more services are delivered, expectations of communities expand. Even FOL groups are expecting more from FOLA, and rightly so. FOLA has also increased its own expectations from seven years ago.

This is the challenge for FOLA. We all have an important role to play in growing Friends. Friends in libraries have never been more needed.

From May 1995 till October 2000, a total of \$12,364.29 was raised. No small effort for these, mostly retired, volunteers, who have time on their hands and of course also more time to use the library's facilities. You assist your library and of course you too reap the benefits.

Funds were spent on books, talking books and videos to the value of \$8,000. An OPAC unit, CD Player, Internet unit, Public Access computer with CD-Rom, extra shelving unites and another trolley were the more visible items installed through finances supplied by FOIL. Not surprising that the Friends are held in high regard by the CEO and the staff of WGRL Corporation. Which chief wouldn't like Friends like FOIL!

Furthermore, FOIL's president is a member of the Library Advisory Committee and he reports back the direction and or any changes in WGRLC's library policies to FOIL members. Input and feedback an important part of his duel role.

The latest Friends activity this year was to organise a "Books-on-Wheels" to the emergency housebound. Questions raised by FOIL concerning this type of voluntary service promoted WGRLC to produce a draft, outlining volunteer policy, which exhaustively covers all legal and other aspects.

And so the Friends continue with their efforts and ... DO make the difference!




Gladstone (Qld)

FOLUSA NEWS

- The search is on. FOLUSA has advertised for the position of Executive Director, following the announcement that foundation director and founder, Sandy Dolnick is steeping down from the end of 2001. More on Sandy in a later issue.
- Friends of the Macon County Public Library is celebrating its 30th anniversary. Since June 2000, the Friends have raised \$34,500 from bookstore sales, thanks to the efforts of 20 Friends volunteers who assist on the weekly basis. It's the only fulltime Friends bookstore in North Carolina. (See under Friends in Focus – Altona)
- Friends of the Tippecanoe Country Public Library hold a silent auction of valuable and interesting items at each booksale. The auction list is posted on the Friends web site in advance, and Friends members are allowed to submit bids by email.

Ten Commandments for Successful Friends

- Library Manager (authority) must want a FOL group.
- Library staff must be willing to work with Friends.
- All parties must realise that a time commitment is involved.
- The Library must agree which of its resources will be used by the Friends.
- A committed core group must exist.
- The authority to which the Library Manager reports must be aware of the FOL group.
- Communication must be open to all groups involved in the use of the library.
- All those involved in the Friends must realise that the Friends group does not make library policy.
- The library must decide, in discussion with the Friends, the roles it wishes to perform.
- All those involved must understand that the library authority and Friends have separate functions.

November - Civic Participation



Dean Jaensch wrote in the *Adelaide Advertiser*, May 3, 2001:


"Modern state governments seem to believe that public funding should go only to enterprises which make a profit.

Library Week is a time when community libraries promote and publicise. The "hidden agenda" is a plea to the public for support so that the libraries can continue to have a strong case to put before their government masters. It is easy to show a financial balance sheet to support a case for further public funding if you happen to be a money-making enterprise.

It is more difficult when the "balance sheet" of libraries is based on public good and public service which has no financial pay-back to governments. So the libraries need all of the support we can give."
