
Jackie Tonkin (Community Services, Noosa Library Service)

Terry Fox collected an oral history from South Coast Aboriginal, Percy Mumbler. He spoke about producing Travelling with Percy with Lee Chittick. Dorothy Jones appealed to the many feminists in the audience with her talk about women writers, many of whom have been neglected. At the Coalface is the first of two books that document the life of coal miners and their communities and we were pleased to have, Fred Moore, to speak about his connection with the book. Representing both the University and the Writers' Centre, Ron Pretty spoke of writ-

ing and publishing in the Illawarra, particularly in the often neglected area of poetry. She has established a following around the Fold Festival circuit for her stories and poems. Her poems have been collected in a book called *Bridging the Gap* and she has her own CD called *Woolly Yarns and Whimsies*. In the tradition of all good entertainment Vic left the audience laughing!

Following these talks the audience of 76 were able to browse through the books these people had been involved with and chat with the speakers while enjoying afternoon tea. All agreed it had been a most interesting and entertaining afternoon.



Pelican Rapids are the winner of the 2003 Kingsolver Award, granted yearly to a Friends of the Libraries organization by FOLUSA.

The group played a major role in easing the pains of change in their community. They sponsored diversity workshops, provided foreign language and learning materials to English as a Second Language courses and helped the library offer free Internet access for the first time. They also created a "Tapestry of Friends" by collecting fibre art from representatives of all the ethnic backgrounds now in their community. Twenty-one artists are represented in the final "Tapestry of Friendship'' - Hispanics, Bosnians and Somali, Czech, Norwegians, Native Americans, French and others.
