

# Libraries build

n the last ten years there has been increasing research aimed at demonstrating how public libraries-the 'new village green' as social researcher Hugh Mackay describes them-uniquely help build communities and that social capital which is so greatly needed in many parts of Australia. Much of this research has come from the UK, the US and Canada. There have been, however, some noteworthy examples from Australia. These include Eva Cox's 2000 A safe place to go: libraries and social capital http://www.sl.nsw.gov.au/pls/ publications/pdf/safe\_place.pdf and in 2004 Candy Hillenbrand's MA thesis *Public libraries* as developers of social capital (University of South Australia), parts of which have been published in March and June 2005 issues of the journal Australasian public libraries and information services.

Adding to the evidence about the great value of public libraries — and to the need to fund them much better than the current 7c per Australian per day — are the outcomes of a two year Victorian study which is the first comprehensive Australian study looking at the value public libraries bring to their communities. Libraries building communities confirms that no other agency has such a wide role, a broad and diverse range of users, and actual and potential impact on the community and the quality of lives.

The study sought the views and ideas of almost 10,000 people via online and telephone surveys, focus groups and interviews and aimed to increase community awareness of the scope of public library services and show how public libraries can help achieve government policy goals. For library staff and Friends of Libraries groups it:



- presents clear new data on the contribution libraries make to their communities
- provides case studies that show how Victorian public libraries lead in innovation
- identifies groups that are not currently well served by their libraries, and offers solutions
- builds awareness of the critical social capital and community role of public libraries.

The findings of the study are presented in four

reports, and are reviewed in an executive summary.

### Report one: Setting the scene

Covers the concept of community building, the Victorian government's policy agenda, the Victorian public library network, project methodology, and relevant research.

### Report two: Logging the benefits

Outlines community views on the role and benefits of public libraries.



nce again, this Friends groups have established themselves as leaders in producing high quality calendars. ### News. Events & Ideas...

### Balmain (NSW)

Another well-attended AGM for FOBL at which Tony Stephens, Walkley Award journalist, long-time member of FOBL, library supporter and local resident addressed the meeting. His title was – *Obituaries (& Other Bits & Pieces)*. He spoke of his 45 years in journalism, his many books and articles from Politics to Sport and his present work to celebrate the 175th birthday of the *Sydney Morning Herald*.

### State Library (SA)

Work of the Friends was acknowledged in the recent Annual Report. Former Director of the State Library of SA stated: "Friends' volunteers have served an essential part in the Library's redevelopment; their patience, perseverance, helpfulness and dedication have played a major part during the transition period from the old Library to the new".

### Salisbury (SA)

Friends Committee endorsed providing \$12,000 for library projects, including, PC chairs for Salisbury West and ingle Farm; language kits for all branches; Salisbury Reading Programme and equipment for the Sports Library (mainly Mawson Lakes).

### Willunga & Aldinga (SA)

'Chocolate Dark and Crunchy' was the poetry session held with local poet David Cookson, together with wine and chocolate – all for a gold coin! FOWAL recently presented the library with a \$2,000 computer for the children's area.

### Thuringowa (Qld)

2005 marks 10 years for the Friends of Thuringowa City Libraries. Booksales since 1998 have raised \$8,935. 1997 Friends bought the first item for the library, a printer, and last year they purchased 6 easy chairs for the magazine section, valued at \$1647.

### Launceston (Tas)

Children's programs received \$500 from a Trivia Night going towards board books and big books for the children's area. A number of Friends help each week in the song and rhyme sessions for toddlers. Friends also provided 'baby bundles' for all children born locally during Library Week.

The annual Book sale in March raised over \$6,000 for purchase of recorded books, large print and DVDs. The sale, organized and run in cooperation with Riverside Lions Club, was the most successful ever.

### National Library (ACT)

Author! Author! – Literary Sundays with Contemporary Writers have included, Louis Nowra, Peter Goldsworthy, Kate Grenville, John Burmingham and David Malouf.

Lauren Donald, acting Executive Officer of the Friends, has accepted a position as the Events Coordinator of the National Library. Lauren was instrumental in helping to organize FOLA's 10th anniversary celebrations at the NLA last December. The new Executive Officer is Jillian Edwards who comes from a background at the National Film and Sound Archive and National Botanic Gardens.

### Wagga Wagga (NSW)

Friends recently organized a trip to the wineries of the Rutherglen region and an afternoon tea for the volunteers who assist with housebound readers, and other voluntary work during the year.

### Bendigo (Vic)

This newly established group have been busy producing brochures, newsletters and membership cards that include a 10% discount at the local Collins Bookshop, thanks to Mandy and Trevor at Collins. In May they held an evening "Trials & Tribulations of Collecting Antiquarian Books" with Darren Wright.

The Friends were addressed by the Chairman of the Board, Cr David Taylor (Bass Coast Shire) and by the Chairman of the Community Advisory Committee, Janet Cram, who is also a member of the Friends of the Cowes (Phillip Island) Library.

The meeting included a wine tasting from the Gurdies Winery and a fruit and sandwich lunch.

The guest speaker after lunch was the TV Script and Drama Writer, Alan Cram, who disclosed the challenges and pleasures of writing for TV. His talk was most informative and entertaining. # Report by Gerrit Stafford (FOLA committee member, SA) FOLA GROUPS IN SOUTH AUSTRALIA

he 3rd annual meeting of FOLA groups in South Australia took place in the Lecture Theatre at the State Library on 22 March. Representatives came from: Barossa, Campbelltown, The Hub Library, Marion, Norwood, Playford, Stirling, University of Adelaide Library, Unley, Willunga & Aldinga and Woodside. Apologies were received from the Murray Bridge group and the meeting was chaired by Gerrit Stafford. An address of welcome was given by Dr Tony Shinkfield AO, President of the Friends of the State Library of SA.

The chairman then introduced Alan Smith, Director of the State Library of SA, who spoke to the meeting about the value of friends. Speaking from twenty-five years experience with museums, art museums and libraries he described "Friends" as the heart of the library. They build the link between the library and the community and play a vital role in converting non-users to users. He maintained that any library without a friends group is a sad library and those with friends groups are more active. His talk was received enthusiastically.

After a tea break, members of the groups reported on their recent activities. Paul Wilkins of the Friends of the University of Adelaide Library spoke of the recent water damage to some 3,000 books, the message being, have a good disaster plan prepared.

Michael Rowney from the Friends of Unley Library, reported that the new library had been refurbished and a new librarian appointed. A change had been made to their constitution so that they became a volunteer group, and therefore came under the Council's insurance cover. In August they acted as host of the FOLA, annual general meeting, which was well attended. From the funds raised, \$500 has been given for the Goodwood easy reading set and \$1,000 provided for the home services.

Jay Allen of the Friends of the Hub Library, informed us that the group, formed in 1991, had a committee of 7 and a membership of 80. They raise \$8,000 a year from computer classes together with another \$1,000 from other sources such as quiz nights and book sales. Each year they give the library \$1,000 and have provide funds for furniture and blinds.

Joan Lewin of the Friends of Playford Library reported that they had held four book sales during the year and had provided eight hundred green bags for the home library service. They intend to buy some outdoor furniture for the Elizabeth Library. The Christmas raffle raised \$1,000.

Christyl Markovic from the Friends of Stirling Library was pleased to report on a new library. The building will also house the toy library and Historical Society. Fund raising has been limited to book sales, the last raising \$2,500. The group was fortunate to receive a bequest of \$30,000 from a women who had been home bound.

Jill Stevens of the Friends of the Barossa Library reported that during the year they had supported the library's "Big Book Club". At these evenings they provide catering. This is not only a source of income but also a means of getting new members. Support during the year has been given to the Faith Lutheran School History Project. The Chief Librarian is very supportive of the Friends and they are represented on the Library Strategy Committee. Membership is 150.

Those present expressed the desire that another meeting should take place next year in the same location. The Chairman thanked Helen Williams, Executive Officer, Friends of the State Library SA for making arrangements and a tour of the Mortlock Wing followed the meeting.


