Friends in the UK: alive and well



n a recent visit to the UK at the end of 2006, I found Friends contributing enormously to libraries, galleries, museums, cathedrals and a wide range of institutions. Friends in the UK are alive and well.

The range and depth of activities has strengthened over the past 20 years, where today, 'Friends of...' have become an established sector in their own right. In fact they are essential to the well-being of many. What is more, they are accepted into the strategic business of the institution. Obviously, I am speaking of some of the large and well known bodies in the United Kingdom ie. Friends of the British Library, Friends of the National Portrait Gallery, Friends of the Royal Academy, Friends of the British Museum, Friends of Westminister Cathedral, Friends of the V&A, Friends of Wigmore Hall, and many more.

Some 20 years ago, many of these groups did not exist, nor did Friends of public library groups around the United Kingdom. And, only after the United States, Australia and Canada, did the UK establish a nation-wide support body for Friends in public libraries. The growth has been rapid and embracing.

Like Australia, many of the now established Friends bodies in the UK have parallels in this country. In fact, museums, galleries and cathedrals world-wide have support bodies such as 'Friends'. However, one significant difference exists between these institutional Friends, and the Friends groups which are found in most public libraries across the country.

Friends in large institutions are often a catalyst for donors. Like-minded individuals with 'contacts' and money, are more common amongst large institutions. This is a model developed throughout large American institutions, along with the philanthropic development of American institutions over the past 200 hundred years, which eventually lead to the development of Friends of Library groups in the United States in the 1890s, and to the Friends of Libraries USA (FOLUSA) movement as we know it today. However, despite some variation, both in country, institution and corporate size, public library FOL groups have much to gain from such established models.

A simple overview of the benefits enjoyed by Friends of these large institutions gives cause to believe we all seek much the same things:

Regular advance information about activities; Priority bookings for events; Friends' newsletter; Being part of a dedicated team of help; A programme of events, trips and visits; Discounts for events and purchases; Occasional offers and promotions; and feeling that we are contributing the 'greater good' of the organisation.

Large institutional Friends display three particular characteristics. Firstly, they regard professional public relations as integral to their objectives. Secondly, financial strength gives rise to donating to the institution and stability of the organisation. And thirdly, being involved in the strategic directions of the institution enables all members a feeling of contributing to the good of the organisation, particularly as much professional talent is on offer, and its 'free'.

Take a look at the Friends of the British Library. They have a well focussed and highly professional 'PR' strategy, from the moment you arrive in the building, with the 'Friends Desk' able to direct and assist visitors to the library, along with a range of printed material. The Friends also assist the library immeasurably, in financial support and in providing outstanding works to the library collection. In 2006 they contributed £100,000 towards the cost of a new Conservation Centre. And finally, through the Friends Manager and Committee, have direct input to Lynne Brindley, CEO of the British Library.

These objectives play a part in successful public library FOL groups. Balmain Friends in NSW have an excellent 'PR' process with highly professional individuals and dissemination of award winning designed information, particularly the newsletter — Balmain Bookworm. The outstanding financial support given by the Friends of the State Library of SA over seven decades has increased the value of the collection and the new library building in Adelaide. And, Friends groups in the West Gippsland Regional Library Corporation have input into decision making at the Regional Library Board.

Strategies for success and development can be found in smaller Friends groups, just as they are acclaimed and celebrated in larger institutions.

We do well to remember, we can learn much in growing our Friends by observing other successful Friends bodies.

Geraldton (WA)

In November the library hosted 'One Book 2007' and 'The Great Literary Debate' at the last event for Friends in 2006. Author of 'The Book Thief' Markus Zusak entertained about 80 people attended an evening at the library in February. The Shire has indicated exploring the feasibility of constructing a multi-purpose use library in the educational precinct near Geraldton Universities Centre. Friends await the outcome!

Thuringowa (Qld)

In 2006 the library won the Queensland Public Libraries Association Public Library of the Year award. Perhaps with a little help from the Friends! At the October meeting the committee agreed to sponsor a display cabinet which will be placed inside the entrance of the refurbished library. Five Year membership certificates were presented to members in November along with Ten Year certificates to four members.

Toowoomba (Qld)

Celebrating 9 years, the Friends Annual Report and President, Terry Carter presented highlights of a very successful year. In 9 years they have contributed over \$70,000 to the library, especially to the Access Centre. Terry also mentioned the wonderful support from Library Manager Ros Cousins and her staff. A great newsletter in February 2007 marks many achievements.

Salisbury (SA)

Bill Hulme, President, in his December newsletter, thanked all Friends who unselfishly give much free time to the Friends Shop. Special acknowledgement was given to Derek and Mary Verringer's conscientious involvement at Shop Managers. The Friends also supported 'One Book One Salisbury' a Book Club where everyone was encouraged to read the same book during August to October. The Friends purchased a coffee machine for use by patrons at the newly refurbished Para Hills Library in March.

Murray Bridge (SA)

A new initiative in August was "Tapping into the Oldies" to interview, record and publish stories of elderly residents in order to preserve their history as part of the local history of the town. During the past 12 months they have held Mini Book sales which have raised \$870. Three street booksales were held during the year averaging \$180. The main fundraiser was the Annual Spring Garden Party held in the Local Government Centre when 90 guests attended. They raised \$300 profit from a door entry raffle. Recently, the Friends have purchased stereo equipment and bean bags for the Teens section and a Big Book Stand made for the Childrens section. A local retiree came up with a fantastic wooden stand , donating his time and the Friends paying for materials. The Friends recently revamped its web site, along with photographs.

Willunga & Aldinga (SA)

In October, the Friends welcomed a visit from the State Library Friends and the Southern Fleurieu Libraries Friends. After a tour of facilities and a sumptuous lunch, they heard from budding young writer Milton Penhaligon who was able to attend a writers camp in Victoria and consequently win a trip to Austria to further his studies. The winners of the writing competition "A Library visit I'll never forget" were then announced, with four winners in both the Adult and Junior sections.

Port Macquarie-Hastings (NSW)

The August Literary Lunch was a great success with guest speaker Susannah Fullerton. Around eighty members attended and it appears that this event is now an annual calendar attraction. In February the Friends celebrated one year since the launch of the successful *Bookstart* program. *Bookstart* is an information pack and board book given to all new parents giving birth at Port Macquarie Base Hospital, to encourage reading from a young age. *Bookstart* packs are funded by funds raised by the Friends, primarily from Booksales.

Blue Mountains (NSW)

It's a novel idea for book lovers — Sally Watson, Friends of Blue Mountains Library recently presented a postcard to Library Manager Vicki Edmunds. The postcards are to be mailed back to the library telling staff why you love the library.

Wingecarribee (NSW)

February speaker was Michael Keenan author of the *Last Horse Standing* and other books, and in March the Hon Kevin Rozzoli former Speaker of the Legislative Assembly and author of *Gavel to Gavel: An insiders view of parliament.*

Balmain (NSW)

Historian, Paula Hamilton was the guest speaker at the annual Christmas function in December. In March they held a Bring and Buy Book Sale. Unfortunately, Council have put on hold the plans to extend and improve the library facilities due to an issue relating to Ficus Hillii trees. Very sad for Balmain who have campaigned tirelessly for improved facilities!

Gladesville (NSW)

The future of the Gladesville Library in Sydney's north has been secured after the council voted unanimously to accept the recommendations of a committee formed to resolve the uncertainty over library funding. This follows a campaign — Save Our Library. As a result a Friends group is being formed for Gladesville.

Wagga Wagga (NSW)

The Friends of the Library recently contributed to the travel and accommodation costs for the local winner of the Riverina Regional Slam Poetry competition to travel to Sydney.

The local competitor was Joseph Appleton, who came second in the final round.

Liverpool (NSW)

This group was one of the strongest groups in Australia some years back, in the late 1980's and early 1990's.

The group has been reactivated with an active program for 2007, February to August. Bus trips, speakers, food demonstrations and luncheons. The Library recognises the contribution of the Friends for adding to the social capital of Liverpool.

Staff and the Mayor, Cr Hardinge joined the Friends at their annual Christmas function at the Altona Bowling Club. The small booksale in February made over \$450. The Friends of Altona and Williamstown combined to donate \$500 to assist in running the *Big Arvo* function for children aged 8-12 years.

Sausage sizzle in the library gardens accompanied the launch of *Faster than lightening* by Pam Harvey and Michael Panchridge. This was regarded as a good day for recruiting new members.

Stirling (SA) – success at last!

Stirling is delighted to report that its new library is currently under construction. The present library building is bursting at the seams and the staff is working under extremely difficult conditions. Fortunately for our community they are a dedicated and cheerful bunch who make the best of things. It is hoped the new building will be ready to occupy early in 2008. This will give a much more library space to support the collection of 45,400 items and an average 728 visitors per day. The Stirling library is the administrative hub for the Gumeracha, Woodside, Stirling and Mobile Libraries, as well as managing the home borrowers program for residents of the Adelaide Hills Council.


At the suggestion of Dr Alan Bundy AO, President of FOLA, and a local resident, the 2006 AGM gave approval to the Committee to change the membership fees of the Friends to a donation rather than a fixed sum. This has resulted in a 40% increase in membership numbers. Donations ranged from 50 cents to \$20 and did not result in less income overall.

We are very excited at the prospect of a contemporary library building in Stirling village and its value to our community.





Six Basics of Working with **Volunteers**

from FOLUSA and the Minnesota **Association of Library Friends (USA)**

Planning – Define your project clearly, and always seek the approval of your librarian. Divide your event into 'chunks' to make planning less formidable, who will do what: what committees are needed; you've got to ask for participation and know what you're going to do.

Recruiting – Don't recruit volunteers until you know what you need! Identify specific tasks and skills, and put your needs on paper. Advertise in a variety of ways.

Some libraries have a volunteer interest sheet.

Orientation and Training – Remember the down-home basics: contact people in advance and follow up with reminders; make the event fun and welcoming for your volunteers; assign greeters, have a sign-in-sheet, and provide a place for volunteers to

put their coats and bags.

Supervision – Coaching, cheerleading' how do Friends handle money? One example: Two Friends members might be in charge of money at a book sale; one Friend and one library staff member might go make the bank deposit right away. Supervisors serve as a support system.

Recognition — Say thank you in person and in writing. Inform all of your volunteers of the results of your project. Consider providing treats or pizza during a full day of service – or offering perks and benefits to volunteers who come in regularly. Do give

thought to what sources of funding for recognition events are appropriate and ethical for Friends.

Evaluation – What went well? What didn't? Note what did and didn't go well – and correct for the next event. It's easy to forget the simplest, most tiny details.


