FOLA president, Dr Alan Bundy wrote to the Premier of Victoria, condemning the actions of Murrindindi Council, and pointing to the overwhelming benefits such a library service delivers to the rural community.

Murrindindi Shire Council mayor John Walsh, CEO Margaret Abbey and Cr Margaret Rae stated that council would be making "considered responses" to the motions passed by meetings held by the

Cultivating Budding Writers



riday 13 September 7pm, the Meeting Room of Balmain Town Hall is brightly lit, its doors are wide open and the sound flowing out of it reminds that of a buzzing beehive. The room looks full to capacity: the audience is a mixture of children and adults happily chatting under the high ceiling of the handsome timber lined historical venue, while from the their portraits along the walls austere former Balmain Councilors look imperturbably, no doubt they would smile... if they could.

It is Award night for the Friends of Balmain Library School Writing Competition 2013, and the excitement among the young ones is palpable.

The FOBL contest, sponsored since its launch by the Balmain-Rozelle Community Bank, and open to all local Primary Schools, is in its 4th edition and the number of participants has nearly doubled when compared to 2010.

The competitors are pupils in Year 5 and Year 6; this year each category of students was required to enter an original short story (800 words) and include in it two key words: writing and story. In alternative they could write a poem about an object, which was special to them or their families.

First prize in each category? A \$100 book voucher from the local Hill of Content Bookshop plus a Balmain Rozelle Community Bank account to the value of \$100. Highly commended students, of which there were fourteen this time, receive a \$50 book voucher. Competing schools collect a \$250 book voucher for their Libraries.

After the traditional warm welcome by Mariella Totaro-Genevois, Chair of FOBL, and a brief friendly address by Ian Ferguson, Director of the Bank, Vivienne Nicoll-Hatton from the competition judging panel, offers an insightful overview and informative perspective of the students' entries.

Skillfully using a power point presentation Vivienne (Nicoll-Hatton) illustrates for the public the criterions followed by the judges, and the way they link-up with the methods used by NSW schools in their teaching of writing skills to young people. She illustrates her presentation with excerpts from the children's stories and poems, so that the young competitors and their parents can actually see and read them on the screen, clearly understanding how and why they have been selected as valuable examples of their creative writing.

The success of this phase of the School Awards night is truly rewarding for all the hard-working FOBL Committee members involved; it is by now clear to us that parents approve of the aims of our contest, sincerely appreciate the transparency of the judging process and thoroughly enjoy seeing their children's work publicly acknowledged and rewarded.

Roughly quoting a wonderful Australian writer for young adults, Nadia Wheatley, 'the relationship between reading and writing can be illustrated as the process of breathing-in and breathing-out'...

It seems to me that if the Friends of Balmain Library can contribute to such vital functions in the life of our local young people then they can be proud of their efforts and look forward to many future nights as the one just described.

The scholarship included a study tour of libraries in the US that run library programs for children with special needs and that also have in place strategies for improviding access for children with special needs and their families. he 19th Annual Meeting of Friends of Libraries Australia Inc was held at the new Melbourne City Library, Flinders Lane, Melbourne on 29 August 2013. In conjunction with the AGM, FOLA held a seminar – "Tale of Two Cities: Exciting Public Library Futures for Geelong and the City of Melbourne", sponsored by *Caval*.

Dr Alan Bundy AM welcomed a large gathering of friends, library managers, librarians and library trade representatives to the event. After the AGM was conducted, Paula Kelly, Library Manager at the City of Melbourne and Patti Manolis, CEO, Geelong Regional Library Corporation along with Jenny Mustey, Library Manager Campaspe Regional Library addressed the gathering on Public Library Futures.

Patti Manolis, Chief Executive Officer, Geelong Regional Library Corporation presented a powerpoint display outlining the history of the library service, the reasons for a new library and the architects intentions.

Current plan / concept ARM ARCHITECTURE.

- Last but not least for CBD resident and workers, this will be their local Library / Community centre / community living room / Third space, the term penned by Ray Oldenburg in his book the great good place.

FOLA President's Report 2013

riends of Libraries Australia was launched, as only the second such association in the world, by its foundation patron, the Hon

Justice Michael Kirby AC CMG at the State Library of Victoria. In this, my eighth report as FOLA president, I acknowledge its great fortune that in 2012 another great Australian, Tom Keneally AO succeeded Michael Kirby to become FOLA's second national patron.

FOLA remains one of the few national associations for Friends of Libraries, although threats to public libraries in countries such as the UK have stimulated forms of regional or national association. As an indicator of recognition of FOLA's existence and achievement for nearly two decades, its executive director and founder Daniel Ferguson has been invited to speak at the 2014 national library conference of the Korean Library Association, South Korea now having about 100 friends of libraries groups.

Australia itself has a public library system which in terms of access, use, buildings, resources and innovation now ranks among the top ten nations worldwide. However there are no grounds for self satisfaction or complacency. Inequities and exclusion abound, and there is still very much work to be done to ensure that everyone in Australia - young and old, citizens, migrants, refugees, the homeless, those with disabilities, and visitors to the country are well served by proactive public libraries which several recent research reports have shown are the best possible investment in community connection and wellbeing by all levels of Australian government.

Thus FOLA in 2013 continued its endeavours towards its vision of *Better, more accessible, libraries for all in Australia,* and its focus, at the national and local levels, on public library advocacy. In 2103 one example of this was FOLA's's Peter McInness Award for Library Services to Children and Young People. This went to the Stirling Public Library in South Australia for an innovative program to meet the needs of children with disabilities. One outcome of this FOLA award was its contribution to the achievement by the program's initiator, Joanne Kaeding, of a Catherine Helen Spence scholarship to investigate similar initiatives in the USA.

Given the very positive outcomes of that award it is, however, disappointing, that FOLA's two other widely advertised national awards, for olders and adults and for public advocacy did not receive sufficient nominations to enable the awarding of either.

During the year FOLA continued to hear about, and report on its website and in its quarterly newsletter, the outcomes from effective partnerships between council, their library managers, and Friends. As was noted in my 2012 report, just how to promote those partnerships, and particularly how to encourage library managers to initiate and support them, has challenged FOLA since its establishment as the volunteer based and very lean organisation it remains to day.

FOLA does not have a federal structure or state or regional branches, but it has always encouraged and helped where possible,

state or regional groups of Library Friends to come together to share their experiences and knowledge, and to help spread word about their value to councils and library managers. There is a statement to this effect on the FOLA website www.fola.org.au.

The only state which has done this consistently is South Australia, which has the highest numbers of Friends groups per capita in Australia, and perhaps not coincidentally the largest membership(over 600) public library Friends group in Australia at Stirling — and overall probably the best supported public library system in the country. On 1 July 2013, for example, the SA Forum for Friends of Libraries which I had the pleasure of attending, was a reinforcing success. This was in large measure due to its exemplary organisation by the Friends of Holdfast Bay Libraries, to be succeeded in 2014 by the SA State Forum organised by the Friends of Salisbury Libraries.

These annual forums could well be emulated at the state and regional level throughout Australia, and FOLA stands ready to advise on their organisation and contribute the attendance of the president or executive director to them.

FOLA also stands ready to respond to often short sighted threats to library services and their funding at the local and state level, particularly in rural areas. In 2013 it unfortunately, as in previous years, had occasion to do so.

The funding of FOLA remains constraining of its advocacy for better libraries for all — numerous individual Friends groups have larger

funds than does it. Nonetheless, this serves to reinforce the value of the relatively few Australian library suppliers who do sponsor its endeavours and awards. Those few are recognised on FOLAs website and newsletter. Among them, it is again not invidious to highlight the generous support of Bolinda Publishing since FOLAs inception in 1994.

My appreciation of the contribution of FOLA's national committee during the year is also expressed, and particularly that of treasurer Kristina Barnett who also served as vice president. Murray Drinnan continued as its valued webmaster.

The Friends of Barossa Libraries in South Australia, with the generous support of its library manager and local authority, hosted the 2012 FOLA AGM at Nuriootpa. It is one of those regional Friends of Libraries which attests to what can be achieved by an effective partnership between a library manager, a council and a well led Friends group as the library voice of its community. Daniel Ferguson continued in 2013 to devote inordinate time over and above full time employment to the wellbeing of FOLA - the organisation which he initiated, and of which he will have been the mainstay for 20 years, in 2014.

There will be very good cause for celebration in 2014 of that initiative and achievement.

There will also be cause for reflection on where FOLA will, and can, be in 2034 — for the need for such an organisation will surely remain.

Rather like democracy itself, the price of better libraries for all, will still require eternal vigilance.

National Gallery Victoria (Vic)

Curator Alisa Bunbury introduced an exhibition of the work of Bea Maddock at an evening at the NGV in May. Bea Maddock is one of Australia's most acclaimed artists, recognised for her innovative and evocative prints.

Altona (Vic)

AGM was held in July, when long-term president (and former FOLA committee member) Margaret Broeks was re-elected president for another term. An active group of 12 members were re-elected to the committee. FOAL are one of the few groups in the country who have an active and ongoing booksale program conducted through the Friends Bookroom, located adjacent to the main library building.

Toowoomba (Qld)

Despite rainy weather, 35 keen readers came to the Toowoomba City Library on 22 May to meet author Jane Grieve. Her first book was Slippin on the Lino, her second in Stockman's Footsteps published in March. The May booksale raised a total of \$2,291.50. A fact sheet discussing the proposed new Toowoomba City Library was recently released by Regional Council. The Friends are following with interest.

Over the 2012 National year of reading, the Friends funded promotions/programs to the value of \$9,000. This was in addition to other funding requests from the library – money well spent. Warren Tracey was elected president of the Friends at the recent AGM. Long time editor of the Friends newsletter and Vice president, Elaine Chippendale has resigned from the committee. Elaine had also been a member of the FOLA committee.

Port Macquarie (NSW)

Another successful author visit took place in March when, Tony Park entertained readers at the library. Toney spent six months of the year in South Africa, where his books are set, and his knowledge of the history, problems, present and future of this region was impressive. In April, Friends visited Vanderley Nursery and Abundance Cafe at Sancrox. AGM was held on 27 September and discussions regarding suggested changes to the running of FOPML in the future were discussed, meaning fewer meetings, more social activities and a proposed larger working committee. Author visits are one of the keys to the Friends success: authors such as Greg Barron, Barry Maitland, Simon French and illustrator Donna Rawlins have been recent speakers.

Some of the projects have been: Annual School Writing Competitions, both for primary and secondary students, and sponsored by the Balmain Rozelle Community Bank, Booksales, Monthly Speakers, updating the web site, documenting the past 15 years of FOBL's history, The Open Book Group, the monthly radio segment with Radio Balmain, publication of Bookworm, and the Nobel Laureates Collection.

Salisbury (SA)

A well attended AGM took place in August. The Friends Bookshop Manager – Derrick Verringer gave a report and thanked volunteers who worked in the shop. President Rosslyn Whitcher also thanked Mary Verringer who prepares the monthly newsletter.

Prospect (SA)

The Friends are seeking goods, gift vouchers that can be used in the Christmas Raffle. All donations are acknowledged in "Books", the Friends newsletter and are acknowledged at the raffle itself. The Friends have in recent times helped with funding of large print books, upgrading computer equipment and sponsoring an annual Children's Writing competition.

Barossa (SA)

The 2013 Annual Report mentioned some of the achievements in the past year — A profit of over \$2200 at the annual raffle, book sales in Lyndoch, Mount Pleasant and Tanunda raising \$2000 and generous donations from a number of sponsors. In the role of advocacy the Friends presented submissions to council for upgrades to Lyndoch and Mount Pleasant libraries and arranged a variety of speakers and other events during the year.

It is noted that Jill Stevens is retiring after 10 years as president and a job extremely well done, and thanked library manager Tania Paull for her support to the Friends.

State Library (SA)

riends of the Library Launceston has recently published a 320 page hardcover book called The Tasmanian Exhibition 1891-92 with over 1000 biographies from the Launceston Family Album. The book has been complied by Prue McCausland and Marion Sargent.

The Launceston Family Album has been an ongoing project since 2004 when the Friends received a grant from the Tasmanian Community Fund to digitise 1186 passport-sized photographs in an album donated to Launceston Library in the 1950s. The photos, of people who had season tickets to the Tasmanian Exhibition of 1891-92, represent a sizable proportion of the population of about 17,000 at that time.

The project involved publishing the photos onto a website, www.launcestonfamilyalbum.org.au and inviting members of the community to help

identify the people in the photos and discover details about their lives. Over 200 contributors were involved and only 90 people remain unidentified – many of them with the name Smith! The website is no longer interactive, but information about the portraits can still be sent in for future revision of the biographies on the website.

This book is the culmination of that project and, as well as the biographies, includes information about the Exhibition itself: how it came about, what it involved, the building of Launceston's iconic Albert Hall and the effect of such a major undertaking on the city itself.
